HON 3301/01	Spiritual & Environmental Values	14026	Dr. Tom Pynn	
<p>Have you ever wondered what the world's major religions have to say about human relationships with nature? In this Honors seminar, students will look at the environmental values shaped by Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Daoism, Jainism, and Shinto, as well as indigenous cultures in the Americas and Africa. In the context of class discussions, they will also examine general philosophical stances toward environmentalism, including deep ecology, the land ethic, and ecofeminism.</p>

<p>Sophomore status required. "City as Text: Berlin" is a hands-on course that examines how we navigate large cities. With a focus on Germany's capital, students will explore key parts of urban landscapes such as transportation, housing, entertainment venues, museums, shopping centers, and historic architecture. In this seminar-style course, students will also read about and discuss moments in Berlin's political and cultural history such as the collapse of the Berlin Wall or the wild Weimar years of artistic experimentation. During the Spring Break travel to Berlin, students will have the chance to practice urban navigation and will get to visit many famous monuments, museums, and palaces.</p>

<p>The Honor's Colloquium on Community Engagement provides students the opportunity to engage in the exploration of a particular social issue through the academic lens of critical theory and practical application. Students will identify personal areas of interest and expand their understanding of the issue through guided research and a 20-hour experiential learning project with an appropriate community partner. In addition to this experiential project, students will explore what it means to live an "engaged life."</p>

<p>In his book <i>Consilience</i>, the famous entomologist and writer Edward O. Wilson argues that "The greatest enterprise of the mind has been and always will be the attempted linkage of the sciences and the humanities," or what he terms "consilience"--a "jumping together" of knowledge across disciplines as disparate as genetics and dystopian fiction. In this honors seminar, we shall explore this notion by examining selected literary works that draw on scientific understanding and scientific works that have the artistic merits of good literature. We shall discover whether C.P. Snow's "two cultures," science and the humanities, have found common ground in their exploration of human nature.</p>
