

# SPRING 2017 HONORS COURSES

For KSU University Honors Students and Dual Enrollment Honors Students

## Distinctions of KSU Honors Courses:

- Open only to University Honors and Dual Enrollment students
- Taught by members of the Honors Faculty
- Smaller class sizes than other sections of the same course
- High academic expectations, but similar workload & number of assignments as non-honors sections. Focus is on quality, not quantity – no busy-work overload!
- Opportunities for interaction with high caliber students
- Designated as Honors courses on your KSU transcript
- Accepted by UGA and many other schools toward their honors program requirements

- **Dual Enrollment (DEHP) students and Undergraduate Honors (UHP) students) must use the CRN designated for their program or they will receive registration errors.**
- Most of the honors courses below fulfill core curriculum requirements at KSU, other University System of Georgia colleges and universities, as well as many other colleges.
- All of the following courses are covered by the Move on When Ready funding program for Dual Enrollment students.
- Rarely, low enrollment in an honors section may necessitate reclassifying the section as a regular section and opening enrollment to non-Honors students.

## KENNESAW CAMPUS COURSES

*Students may take honors classes on either campus. However, if you are commuting between campuses, we recommend allowing at least 45 minutes to drive between campuses and park.*

### English Honors Sections

Honors sections of English 1102 focus on effective writing in a variety of contexts. They require the same number of essays as regular sections, but emphasize a more intensive peer-review process, greater depth of discussion of composition topics, and the opportunity for close interaction with other honors students, as well as the Honors instructor. Class size is limited to 18 students.

### **ENGL 1102 – Composition II Honors Sections**

English 1102 is the second half of the freshman composition sequence and focuses on writing the college research paper. **Prereq:** ENGL 1101 or a score of “3” or “4” on the AP Language or Literature exam.

**MATH 2202 - Honors Calculus II.** Calculus II topics include integral calculus, infinite sequences and series, techniques of integration, and Taylor Series. In addition to analytical methods, computing will be used to conduct numerical studies of integrals and series. *Note: Calculus II is a 4-credit course that meets for a longer class period than 3-credit courses. Prereq: C or better in MATH 1190 or AP Calc AB score of 4-5 or AP Calc BC score of 3.*

**ECON 2100-Microeconomics** requires a prerequisite of completion of a math course at KSU or testing into MATH 1112 or higher on the MAPT. Course content includes analysis of price and output determination under various market structures, income distribution, resource allocation, domestic problems and international trade. ECON 2100 fulfills a KSU core requirement for all majors and is required for Business majors and International Affairs majors. ECON 2100 carries a Business Core Course fee of \$30.

#### **COM 1100 – Human Communication**

Human Communication emphasizes theory and practice of effective communication skills in interpersonal, small group and presentational contexts. You will examine verbal and nonverbal communication, listening skills, assertive vs. aggressive communication, the power of language, audience adaptation skills, intercultural communication, and communication through technology.

Students will complete written assignments connecting communication artifacts to everyday life, speak on a panel for a group discussion, and present findings from a career-focused interview concentrating on group communication. Human Communication fulfills a core requirement for all majors at KSU.

#### **MATH 2202 - Honors Calculus II.**

Includes practice in writing such typical documents as technical descriptions, instructions, proposals, and recommendation reports. Emphasis placed on planning, organizing, and writing reports; designing visual aids; and editing. Among other assignments, at least one complete technical report is required. TCOM 2010 is not a core class at KSU, however, it is required by many of the Engineering, Computer Science and other technology majors housed on the Marietta campus. *Prereq: ENGL 1102.*
